Request for Curriculum Council Action Course Catalog Description and Written Rationale

for

New Course: BUS 220 Foundations of Information Systems

Course Catalog Description:

Application of information systems (IS) for competitive advantage. Students learn to apply management concepts to understand threats posed by and opportunities offered through the effective use of IS. Students will develop advanced competency in understanding various technologies and their effective uses. Discussions focus on companies such as Google, Netflix & Facebook.

Written Rationale:

Foundations of Information Systems was taught in the Fall of 2009 as a Special Topics seminar, cross listed as seminar in Marketing and Management (BUS 339/349 - Foundations of Digital Enterprises and Markets). This request to establish the course topic as a standing course is meant to ease advising and student planning to increase the transparency for the Marketing and Management concentration within the Business Administration major.

Foundations of Information Systems provides an understanding of and skills related to Information Systems suitable for all students, regardless of major. The foundation course is regularly taught in general business administration curricula and is a core course for all IS programs. The last external review (2007) of the IWU business administration curriculum noted the absence of IS courses and strongly recommended adding IS courses based on the analysis of our peer schools (Bellarmine, Susquehanna, Millikin, Millsaps etc.) and the demand by future employers for an exposure to IS as part of an adequate business education. Hence the interest of the business administration faculty is high because the proposed course would offer IWU students a learning opportunity that is commonly available in the majority of undergraduate Business Administration programs.

Taught as a special topics seminar in 2009, the course was well received by the students. Out of the 23 students enrolled in the class, 19 strongly agreed and 3 agreed that they would

recommend the class to another student. The importance of the class for their business education was also reflected in their qualitative course evaluations:

- I found all of the case write-ups to be very interesting, and wished we had more things like that. Coming into this class I knew very little about technology and found this course to be a great start. Going into interviews this year I felt much more confident knowing technology concepts and terms".
- The course design was well planned and well thought out. I thought ALL the case writeups were helpful and kept us up to date on how technology relates with business. Good introduction course to how technology dominates the business world.
- I really enjoyed this course and am happy that I took it. I learned a lot about IT and am happy that IWU offered a course that focused on this subject.
- I learned much more information than I thought I would and learned so much more on subjects I thought I had a good grasp on. It was very worthwhile and I hope that IWU incorporates a technology division in the business department in the near future.

Sascha Vitzthum would continue to teach the class, and because the course was already taught in the current academic year, the requested change would have limited impact on other course offerings and department staffing. Establishing BUS 220 as a standing course would not result in the deletion of any course. The 200-level is appropriate for this course because it both serves as an introductory course to both business administration and IS. The only prerequisite for this course is second semester standing.

This course will not require new library, computer or media resources.
